CHRISTCHURCH NEW ZEALAND

Christchurch provides big city opportunities, without big city stresses – students here are thriving in a safe, creative and stimulating environment.




















RICCARTON HIGH SCHOOL

Riccarton High School is a state run, coeducational school with a roll of just over 1100. Each year we host up to 80 international students for long or short-term study. Our minimum enrolment period is 10 weeks.

With 25 years' experience in hosting international students, we offer a dedicated International Student Department consisting of three full time staff members and two part time language support staff. This enables us to give our international students the individual attention and the opportunities to reach their full potential in a caring, student-focused, academically rigorous environment.

We have a focus on academic excellence and a reputation for achieving success. Our qualification results are above the national averages and our students regularly win scholarships as well as local, regional and national competitions.

Our school offers opportunities to participate in sport, drama, music, and cultural groups. These activities allow students from overseas to develop their social skills, a sense of commitment to the school and its culture – they help build the Riccarton experience.

We are a diverse community – diverse in ethnicity, values and abilities. About 30% of our students were born overseas (from over 40 different countries) and we enjoy the multicultural richness that this brings to the school.

CURRICULUM

Riccarton High School has designed a curriculum for the junior school (Years 9 and 10) which meets the requirements of the New Zealand Curriculum and allows all students to receive an education in the faculty areas of English, Mathematics, Science, Social Sciences, Health and Physical Education, Technology, The Arts, and Languages.

Our curriculum is structured to provide students with a depth of experience in a broad range of subjects. As students progress into the senior school at Year 11, the range of subjects that students are required to take reduces.


NCEA

NCEA (the National Certificate of Educational Achievement) is the main secondary school qualification in New Zealand. Levels 1-3 can be completed in 1-3 years from year 11. NCEA is recognised globally as entrance to tertiary institutions world-wide.

NON-NCEA PROGRAMME

Many international students choose to come for a short-term experience rather than to gain a qualification. For students not sitting end of year exams we provide a three week programme free of charge with fun, outdoor activities and a one week tour of the south island free of charge.

ENGLISH FOR SPEAKERS OF OTHER LANGUAGES (ESOL)

Riccarton High School offers one of the most comprehensive English language programmes among New Zealand secondary schools.

The programme creates a pathway from years 9 – 13, from our Intensive English course, (12-16 hours per week), to the English for Academic Purposes course, ideal for tertiary preparation.

International students do not need a minimum English language level to apply to Riccarton High School. Our testing and placement is done at school during the orientation programme.

As students' English language levels increase, their ESOL class time reduces and is replaced with mainstream school subjects. An advanced ESOL learner may only take four hours per week of a high-level EAL class, such as English for Academic Purposes.

ENGLISH & NCEA EXAMINATIONS

For long-term students expecting to graduate from Riccarton High with NCEA Levels 2 or 3, it is strongly advised that students start this process with a level of English equivalent to IELTS level 5 (academic).

The International Department is available to consult and advise students on the best course of study to meet their long-term education goals after completing Riccarton High School.



Riccarton High School arranges homestay accommodation for its international students. Many of our homestays are within walking distance of the school and for those a little further away, the school is on a main bus route, so transport to and from school is easy, safe and convenient.

Homestays are organised by the school before students arrive, based on students preferences and interests indicated in our Enrolment Document.

All homestays are vetted by the New Zealand Police and regularly inspected by our dedicated Homestay Manager to ensure the highest quality in safety and reliability.

Homestay accommodation includes:

- > Fully furnished bedroom, including writing desk
- > Airport pick up/drop off
- > All meals, linen and laundry
- > Regular interviews and checks with the school's homestay manager

STUDENT SERVICES

DEANS

As well as a dedicated International Office, there is a Dean in charge of each year level. The Deans place students in classes and subjects and are responsible for the discipline and welfare of their students.

COUNSELLORS

Riccarton High School has two counsellors who ensure students receive information to assist them to make positive, informed and appropriate decisions about their future. The counsellors are also available if students have specific concerns about anything at school or home.

CAREERS ADVICE & EMPLOYMENT

Riccarton High School has a school-wide career development programme. It is a student-centred, holistic approach where the students at each year level are interviewed either individually or in small groups on an annual basis. The Careers Adviser also has access to comprehensive network of employers and tertiary institutions allowing for individual pathways to be developed dependent on student need.

Under the New Zealand Immigration Service Policy Guidelines students are permitted to work while studying in New Zealand. Year 12 and Year 13 students may apply in writing to the school for permission to work up to 20 hours per week during term time. You cannot start work until you have received the Variation of Conditions of Student Permit from New Zealand Immigration services.

UNIVERSITY ENTRANCE REQUIREMENTS

To qualify for entrance of a university in New Zealand the student must obtain from the national qualifications framework:

- Three subjects at Level 3, made up of 14 credits each, in three approved subjects.
- Literacy 10 credits at Level 2 or above, made up of 5 credits in ready and 5 credits in writing
- > Numeracy 10 credits at Level 1



PREPARATION

BYOD (BRING YOUR OWN DEVICE)

All new students are expected to bring a suitable electronic device to school. An internet capable device is now an important part of student's toolkit, giving them access to unlimited resources and enabling them to support, extend, collaborate and share their learning in a way that prepares them for the future. ORIENTATION

Comprehensive multi-day international orientation programmes run each at the start of every term.

During this time students are tested in English, mathematics, science, briefed on school rules, uniform is selected and new friends are made. Mini-orientations are run for students who arrive outside our main orientation times. Please consult with the International Department if you cannot arrive for the start of any given term.

MEDICAL AND TRAVEL INSURANCE

It is a Government requirement that you have a medical and travel insurance policy before you depart from your home country for New Zealand. Riccarton International can arrange insurance for you through Unicare or Southern Cross. You may request this service during enrolment.





Step 1. Apply

Apply with the following documents:

- Completed and signed enrolment contract (downloaded from https://www.riccarton.school.nz/wpcontent/uploads/2019/05/2019-Enrolment-Contract.pdf
- Copies of two most recent school reports
- > Letter of recommendation from a Teacher at the student's school
- A letter from the student stating the reasons for applying to study at Riccarton High School
- A copy of the student's passport including passport number and expiry date
- A copy of the student's insurance policy only if they are using their own provider and not organising insurance through the Riccarton High School

Step 2. Review

Riccarton High School reviews the application; successful applicants will receive a fees invoice and offer of place

Step 3. Payment

Pay the fees to Riccarton High School, who in return issues a fees receipt and confirmation letter.

- For students wishing to undertake NCEA examinations, it is strongly advised that students arrive with an English level equivalent to IELTS 5.5 (academic)
